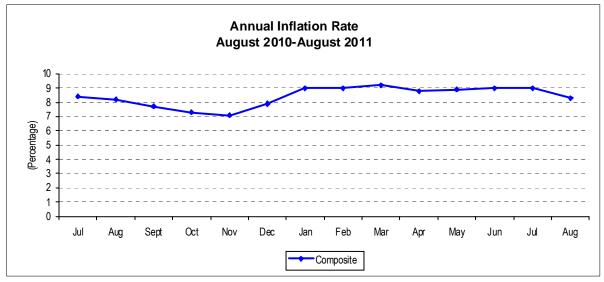

INFLATION

August Inflation declines to 8.3 percent

The annual rate of inflation, as measured by the all items Consumer Price Index (CPI), declined to 8.3 percent in August 2011 from 9.0 percent in July 2011. The decrease is attributed to reductions in food and non-food prices.

Between July 2011 and August 2011, annual inflation rates reduced for Food, beverages and tobacco; Clothing and footwear; Household fuel and lighting; Medical care; and Furniture and

household goods. The annual rates of inflation increased for Transport and communication; Recreation and education; and other goods and services.

The Annual food and Non-food inflation rate

The annual food inflation rate was recorded at 5.4 percent in August 2011. This is a decrease from 5.9 percent in July, 2011. Furthermore, the annual non-food

inflation rate was recorded at 10.9 percent in August, 2011. This is a decrease from 11.8 percent in July 2011.

National Average Prices of Selected Products

A comparison of retail prices between July 2011 and August 2011, shows that the national average price of a 25 kg bag of white breakfast mealie meal slightly reduced by 0.3 percent, from K47,987 to K47,855. The average price of 1kg of dried kapenta (Mpulungu) reduced by 5.5 percent, from K55,179 to K52,132 while the average price of 1kg of tomatoes reduced by 8.4 percent, from K4,492 to K4,114.

However, the national average price of a 20 litre tin of maize grain increased by 4.2 percent, from K16,973 to K17,678. The national average price of a 25 kg bag of white roller mealie meal slightly increased by 0.2 percent, from K33,536 to K33,604. The national average price of 1kg of dressed chicken increased by 2.0 percent, from K16,788 to K17,126, while the national average price of 1kg of fresh fish (bream) increased by 2.7 percent, from K16,366 to K16,801.

INTERNATIONAL MERCHANDIZE TRADE

July 2011 Records Trade Surplus

Zambia recorded a trade surplus valued at K440.7 Billion in July 2011, representing a nominal decrease in growth of about 19.7 percent from K527.3 billion recorded in June 2011. This means that the country exported more in July 2011 than it imported, in the same month, in nominal terms.

Since January 2011the country has had monthly trade surpluses with the highest valued at K1,484.3 billion recorded in January 2011 and the lowest in July 2011, valued at K440.7 billion.

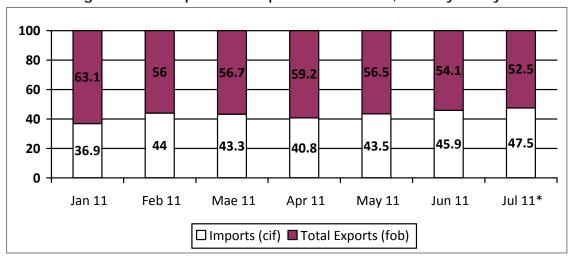

The percentage share of exports between January and July 2011 was higher than that of imports, with the month of January recording the highest percentage share of exports with 63.1 percent while July 2011 recorded the lowest share of exports (52.5 percent).

Exports by Major Product Categories July and June 2011

Zambia's major export products in July 2011 were from the Intermediate goods category (mainly comprising copper cathodes and sections of refined copper) accounting for 84.8 percent. Other exports were from the Consumer goods, Raw materials and Capital goods categories; which collectively

accounted for 15.1 percent of total exports in July 2011. This implies that between July and June 2011, the country has been a net exporter of Intermediate goods, mainly Metals and their articles, accounting for an average of 84.2 percent of the total exports.

Zambia's Metal Exports and Non-Traditional Exports (NTEs) July and June 2011

There has been an increase in the total value of exports from K3,528.6 billion to K3,587.5 billion between June and July, 2011. The overall contribution of Metals and their products to the total export

earnings in July and June 2011 averaged about 77.1percent. The share of NTEs recorded an average of about 23.0 percent in revenue earnings between June and July 2011.

Zambia's Major Export Destinations by Commodity in July 2011

Zambia's major export destination in July 2011 was Switzerland, which accounted for 60.0 percent. The major export products were Cathodes & sections of cathodes of refined Copper accounting for 85.4 percent.

China was the second major destination of Zambia's total exports accounting for 14.1 percent. The major export product to China was copper blister (46.1 percent).

South Africa was the third major destination of Zambia's exports accounting for 7.4 percent. The main export products to South Africa were Articles of cobalt (nes), accounting for 24.7 percent.

The Democratic Republic of Congo was the fourth major destination of Zambia's exports, accounting for 4.4 percent. The main export product to the Democratic Republic of Congo was Raw cane sugar in solid form accounting for 13.2 percent.

The United Kingdom was the fifth major destination of Zambia's total exports accounting for 2.9 percent. The major export products to the United Kingdom were Cathodes and sections of cathodes of refined copper accounting for 84.3 percent.

These five countries collectively accounted for 88.8 percent of Zambia's total export earnings in July 2011.

Export Market Shares by Regional Groupings, July and June 2011

The Southern African Development Community (SADC) regional grouping was the largest market for Zambia's total exports, accounting for 17.7 percent in July 2011. Within SADC, South Africa was the dominant market in July and June 2011 with 41.9 and 44.7 percent, respectively. Congo (DR) was second in both July and June 2011 with 25.1 and 19.0 percent, respectively. Other notable markets were Zimbabwe, Mauritius and Malawi.

Asia was the second largest market for Zambia's total exports, accounting for 15.1 percent in July 2011. Within Asia, China was the dominant market in both July and June 2011 with 93.9 and 82.2 percent, respectively. Singapore was the second dominant market in both June and July 2011 with 3.5 and 11.5 percent, respectively. Other notable markets were United Arab Emirates, India and Hong Kong.

The Common Market for Eastern and Southern Africa (COMESA) grouping of countries was the third largest market for Zambia's total exports accounting for 10.4 percent in July 2011. Within COMESA, Congo (DR) was the dominant market with 42.8 percent in July 2011 and 34.1 percent in June 2011. Zimbabwe was the second dominant market in July 2011 with 18.4 percent, while Malawi was the second dominant market in June 2011, with 27.2 percent. Other notable markets were Mauritius and Kenya.

The European Union (EU) was the fourth largest market for Zambia's total exports accounting for 5.6 percent in July 2011. Within the EU, the United Kingdom was the dominant market with 52.8 and 51.4 July and June percent in 2011. respectively. Luxembourg was the second dominant market in July 2011 with 20.5 percent. Other notable markets were Belgium, Slovenia, Netherlands and Germany.

Imports by Major Product Categories, July and June 2011

Zambia's major import products by category in July 2011 were from the Raw Materials category, accounting for 32.5 percent. The Capital goods category was second with 30.9 percent, followed by the intermediate category with 24.3

percent. Consumer goods category was fourth with 12.3 percent. Between July and June 2011, the country has been a net importer of Capital goods and Raw materials, contributing an average of 31.2 and 30.7 percent, respectively.

Zambia's Major Import Sources by Commodity, July 2011

The major source of Zambia's imports in July 2011 was South Africa, accounting for 33.1 percent. The major import products from South Africa were Dumpers for off-highway use, contributing 3.7 percent to the share of imports.

The second main source of Zambia's imports in July 2011 was Congo (DR)

accounting for 19.5 percent of the total value of imports. The major import products from Congo DR were Copper ores and concentrates, accounting for 84.9 percent.

Other notable sources of Zambia's imports were China, Kuwait and India, collectively accounting for 23.4 percent of Zambia's total imports in July 2011.

Import Market Shares by Regional Groupings, July and June 2011

The Southern African Development Community (SADC) regional grouping was the largest source of Zambia's imports accounting for 55.9 percent in July 2011. Within SADC regional grouping, South Africa was the major source of Zambia's imports with 59.1 percent in July 2011 and 59.3 percent in June 2011. Congo (DR) was the second major source of Zambia's imports with 34.8 and 35.4 percent in July and June 2011, respectively. Other notable markets were Zimbabwe, Namibia and Tanzania.

Asia was the second largest source of Zambia's imports accounting for 29.5 percent in July 2011. Within Asia, China was the dominant source of Zambia's imports in both July and June 2011 with 39.8 and 45.7 percent, respectively. Kuwait was the second dominant source of Zambia's imports with 30.0 percent in July 2011. Other notable markets were India, the United Arab Emirates and Japan.

Agricultural Statistics

The 2010/2011 Post Harvest Survey is underway!

The Central Statistical Office (CSO) will this year conduct the Post Harvest Survey (PHS) during the months of September and October. The survey will be conducted in all the districts of the country. A total number of 13,600 households that were interviewed in March during the Crop Forecasting Survey (CFS) will again be interviewed. In addition, all the large-scale farms in the country will be covered. Unlike the CFS, the PHS will also collect information on livestock numbers and livestock products. The major objectives of the 2010/2011 PHS are;

- To provide Key Agriculture Performance Indicators (KAPIs) for the National Development Plans. The indicators that will be generated from the PHS will include land under irrigation, percentage change in livestock and poultry population of cattle, pigs, goats and sheep and disease prevalence of major livestock disease outbreaks such as Foot and Mouth Disease (FMD), Contagious Bovine plurolpneumonia (CBPP) and East Coast Fever (ECF).
- To provide benchmark data for the Sixth National Development Plan (SNDP).
- To provide indicators of seasonal agricultural performance for planning and research to public institutions, private sector and other stakeholders and the farmers themselves.
- To provide agricultural production figures used for calculating agricultural contribution to the country's Gross Domestic Product (GDP).
- To provide Government institutions, the donor community and other international partners with useful information that will enable the formulation of developmental programs for improving food security.
- To provide baseline data used in carrying out Vulnerability Assessment and Mapping (VAM).
- To generate information that will contribute towards preparedness and mitigation of disasters.
- To provide both the Ministry of Agriculture and Cooperatives, the Ministry of Livestock and Fisheries and the Ministry of Finance and National Planning (MFNP) with indicators for Agricultural Sector Performance Analysis for agricultural policy, planning and decision making.

In preparation for the commencement of the survey, the training of trainers has been conducted while the training of Supervisors and Enumerators is expected to start during the first week of September 2011.
