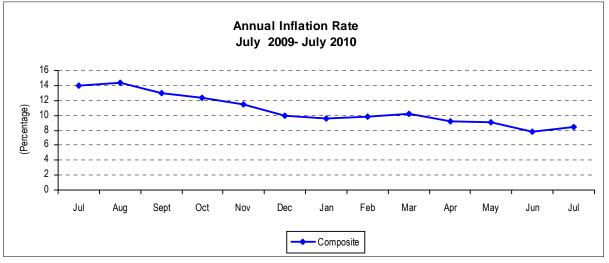

INFLATION

Inflation increases to 8.4 percent in July 2010 from 7.8 percent in June 2010.

The annual rate of inflation, as measured by the all items Consumer Price Index (CPI), increased to 8.4 percent in July 2010 from 7.8 percent in June, 2010. The increase is attributed to increases in food and non-food prices.

Changes in annual inflation rates for CPI Main Groups

Between June 2010 and July 2010, annual inflation rates increased for food, beverages and tobacco; clothing and footwear; household fuel and lighting; furniture and household goods; transport

and communication and other goods and services. The annual inflation rates reduced for medical care, recreation and education.

National Average Prices of Selected Products.

A comparison of retail prices between June 2010 and July 2010 shows that the national average price of 25 kg bag of white roller meal reduced by 5.9 percent, from K40,161 to K37,809. The average price of a 20 litre tin of maize grain also reduced by 5.1 percent, from K19, 570 to K18, 567.

The national average price of 1kg tomatoes increased by 3.3 percent, from K3,493 to K3,607. The national average price of 1kg of dried kapenta (Siavonga) also increased by 6.0 percent, from K50, 710 to K53, 748.

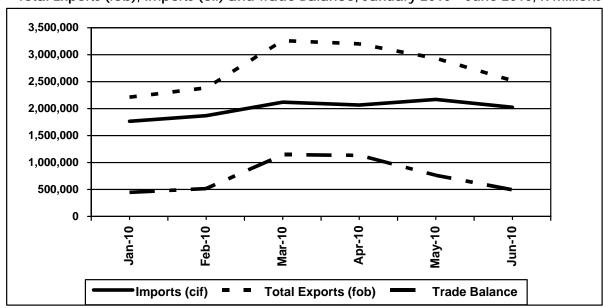

Exports by major product categories June 2010 and May 2010

Zambia's major export products in June 2010 were from the intermediate goods category (mainly comprising of copper cathodes and sections of refined copper and copper blister) accounting for 77.6 percent. Raw materials category (mainly

comprising cobalt ores & concentrates and copper ores & concentrates) was second with 13.0 percent. Other exports were consumer goods and capital goods which collectively accounted for 9.4 percent of total exports for June 2010.

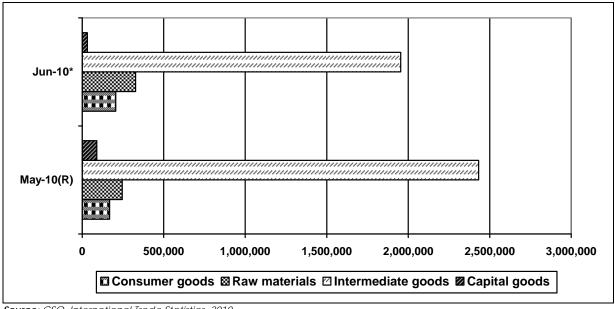

Zambia's Metal Exports and Non-Traditional Exports (NTEs) June 2010 and May 2010

There has been a reduction in the total value of exports between June and May 2010. The country's ever dominant metal products recorded a lower value in revenue growth of -18.2 percent in nominal terms, between June and May 2010. The overall contribution of metal products to the total exports earnings

was 76.6 and 80.4 percent in June and May 2010, respectively.

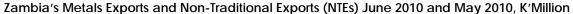
In terms of percentage contribution to the total export earnings, NTEs recorded 23.4 and 19.6 percent in June and May 2010, respectively.

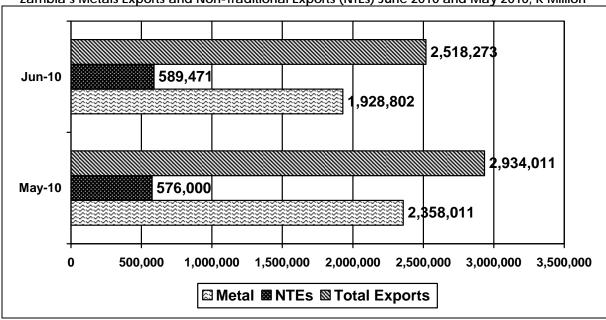
Zambia's Metals Exports and Non-Traditional Exports (NTEs) June 2010 and May 2010, K'Million.

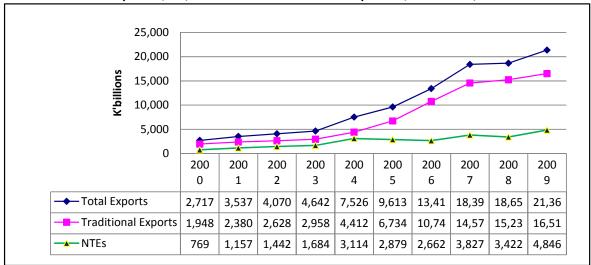

Zambia's Major Exports Classified by Harmonized Coding System (HS), June 2010

Zambia's major export products in June 2010 were copper related including copper and articles thereof; and ores, slag & ash collectively accounting for 79.3 percent of total export earnings. Other export products were other base metals, cermets and articles

thereof (3.2 percent); Tobacco and manufactured tobacco substitutes (3.0 percent) and sugars & sugar confectionery (2.0 percent). These five product categories collectively accounted for 87.5 percent of Zambia's total export earnings for June 2010.

Zambia's Major Export Destinations by Product in June 2010

The five major destinations of Zambia's exports in June 2010 were Switzerland (39.9 percent), China (27.1 percent), South Africa (11.8 percent), United Arab Emirates (6.0 percent) and Democratic Republic of Congo (4.8 percent). These five countries collectively accounted for 89.6 percent of Zambia's total export earnings.

Zambia's major export destination was Switzerland accounting for 39.9 percent. The major export products to Switzerland were: cathodes & sections of cathodes of refined copper (65.2 percent); copper blister (15.0 percent); Plates, sheets and strip, of refined copper uncoiled (7.6 percent); copper ores and concentrates (7.2 percent) and Cobalt ores and concentrates (2.8 percent).

China was the second largest destination of Zambia's total exports accounting for 27.1 percent. The major export products to China were cathodes & sections of cathodes of refined copper (49.0 percent); copper blister (25.2 percent); Plates, sheets and strip, of refined copper uncoiled (21.2 percent); Ash and residues containing mainly copper (1.4 percent) and Nickel ores and concentrates (1.3 percent).

Zambia's third major export destination was South Africa with 11.8 percent. The major export products to South Africa were other, articles of cobalt, nes (21.4 percent); Wire of refined copper, maximum cross-sectional dimension >6mm (15.8)percent); semimanufactured gold (incl. gold plated with platinum) (12.4 percent); Precious metal ores and concentrates excl. Silver (11.4 percent) and Nickel ores and concentrates (10.8 percent).

United Arab Emirates was the fourth largest destination of Zambia's total exports accounting for 6.0 percent. The major export products to United Arab Emirates were Cathodes and sections of cathodes of refined copper (82.2 percent) and Plates, sheets and strip, of refined copper, uncoiled (17.8 percent).

The Democratic Republic of Congo was the fifth largest destination of Zambia's total exports accounting for 4.8 percent. The major export products to the Democratic Republic of Congo were: Raw cane sugar, in solid form (11.0 percent); Portland cement(excl. white) with 10.2 percent; Sulphuric acid, oleum in bulk (7.6 percent); Wheat or meslin flour (6.9 percent); and Magnesia and other magnesium oxide (6.2 percent).

Export Market Shares by Regional Groupings, June 2010 and May 2010

Asia was the largest market for Zambia's total exports, accounting for 33.6 and 36.5 percent in June and May 2010, respectively. Within Asia, China was the dominant market in both months with 80.6 percent in June and 81.6 percent in May 2010. The United Arab Emirates was the second dominant market with 18.0 and 17.3 percent in June and May 2010, respectively. India was the third largest market with 0.6 percent in June and 0.4 percent in May 2010. Other key markets were Singapore, Israel and the Philippines.

Southern African Development Community (SADC) regional grouping was the second largest market for Zambia's total exports, accounting for 22.8 and 19.3 percent in June and May 2010, respectively. Within SADC, South Africa was the dominant market in June and May 2010 with 51.9 and 57.9 percent, respectively. Congo DR was second with 21.0 percent in June and 21.5 percent in May 2010. Malawi was the third largest market with 10.8 and 8.5 percent in June and May 2010, respectively. Other notable markets were Zimbabwe and Tanzania.

The Common Market for Eastern and Southern Africa (COMESA) grouping of countries was the third largest market for Zambia's total exports accounting for 11.6 and 8.2 percent, in June and May 2010, respectively. Within COMESA, Congo DR was the dominant market in both months with 41.4 and 50.5 percent in June and May 2010, respectively. Malawi was the second dominant market with 21.3 percent in June and 20.1 percent in May 2010. The third largest market was Zimbabwe with 17.7 and 14.7 percent in June and May 2010, respectively. Other notable key markets were Kenya, Burundi and Egypt.

The European Union (EU) was the fourth largest market for Zambia's total exports accounting for 1.9 and 1.1 percent in June and May 2010, respectively. Within the EU market, the dominant market in June 2010 was Belgium with 55.4 percent, while in May 2010 Netherlands was the dominant market with 42.8 percent. Other notable markets were the United Kingdom, Germany, France and Denmark.

Total Exports by Major Ports of Exit, June and May 2010 (K' million)

Zambia's six major ports of exit for exports from various sources in June 2010, were Ndola, Chirundu, Kitwe, Livingstone, Kapiri-Mposhi and Nakonde port offices. The Ndola port office was the major port of exit with 26.6 and 28.5 percent of Zambia's total exports in June and May 2010, respectively. This is attributed to the copper and cobalt that are mainly exported through Ndola port office. Chirundu was the second major port of

exit with 19.2 and 20.8 percent in June and May 2010, respectively.

The Kitwe port office was third with 15.0 and 18.1 percent in June and May 2010, respectively. Livingstone port office accounted for 11.2 percent while Kapiri-Mposhi and Nakonde port offices accounted for 10.1 and 3.8 percent, respectively. The six ports collectively accounted for 85.9 percent.

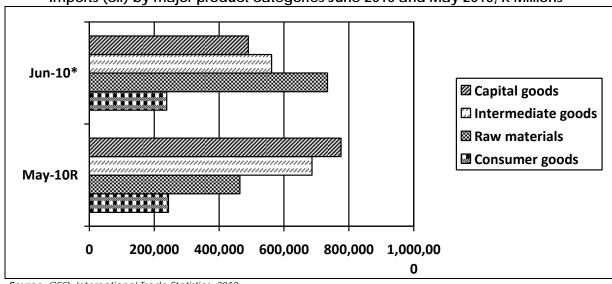

Zambia's Major Import Sources by Product, June 2010

The major source of Zambia's imports in June 2010 was South Africa accounting for 34.4 percent. The major import products from South Africa were other fertilizers, nes (2.9 percent); Dumpers for off-highway use (2.8 percent); Parts of machinery of 84.26, 84.29 & 84.30, nes (2.4 percent); Diesel dual purpose vehicles for both persons & goods (2.3 percent) and Parts of pumps for liquids (1.7 percent).

The second main source of Zambia's imports in June 2010 was Congo DR accounting for 22.3 percent of the total value of imports. The major import

products from Congo DR were: Copper ores and concentrates (57.3 percent); cobalt ores and concentrates (24.7 percent); Cobalt oxides and hydroxides, Commercial cobalt oxide (15.4 percent); and Self-propelled graders and levelers (0.9 percent.

Other notable sources of Zambia's imports were Kuwait, China and India, collectively accounting for 18.8 percent of Zambia's total imports in June 2010.

Import Market Shares by Regional Groupings, June 2010 and May 2010

Southern African Development Community (SADC) regional grouping was the largest source of Zambia's imports accounting for 60.0 and 55.4 percent in June and May 2010, respectively. Within the SADC region, South Africa was the major source of Zambia's imports in both months with 57.3 percent in June and 59.3 percent in May 2010. Congo DR was the second major source of Zambia's imports with 37.1 and 33.8 percent, in June and May 2010, respectively. Other key market sources were Zimbabwe, Tanzania, Swaziland, and Mozambique.

Asia was the second largest source of Zambia's imports in June 2010 accounting for 26.1 percent. Within Asia, Kuwait was the dominant market in both months with 46.7 percent in June and 35.2 percent in May 2010. China was the second largest source of Zambia's imports with 16.0 percent in June 2010, while India was second in May 2010 with

18.2 percent. Other notable markets were United Arab Emirates and Japan. The Common Market for Eastern and Southern Africa (COMESA) grouping of countries was the third largest source of Zambia's imports in June 2010 accounting for 25.8 percent. Within COMESA, Congo DR dominated as the main source of Zambia's imports with 86.4 and 85.1 percent in June and May 2010, respectively. Other notable sources were Kenya, Zimbabwe, Swaziland, Mauritius, Malawi and Egypt.

The European Union (EU) was the fourth largest source of Zambia's imports in June 2010 with 9.2 percent. Within the EU, the United Kingdom was the major source of Zambia's imports accounting for 21.7 percent in June 2010. Germany was the second largest source of Zambia's imports with 17.1 percent in June 2010. Other key markets were Belgium, Sweden, Netherlands and Ireland.

National Accounts Statistics

Gross Domestic Product by Type of Expenditure

The Gross Domestic Product (GDP) by type of expenditure, which measures the expenditures on final consumption, gross capital formation and net exports, was valued at K61,615 billion in 2009. The largest component of the GDP by type of expenditure was the final consumption expenditures, which accounted for 71.6 percent of the total GDP in 2009.

The final consumption expenditure, which consists of government and household final consumption expenditure, was valued at K44,110.9 billion in 2009 compared to K38,028.3 billion in 2008. Government final consumption expenditure, which consists of

expenditure incurred by general government on both individual and collective consumption goods and services, increased from K11,486.6 billion in 2008 to K14,013.6 billion in 2009. This increase accounted for 22.7 percent of the total GDP.

Household final consumption expenditure, which consists of expenditure incurred by resident households on individual consumption goods and services, increased from K26, 541.7 billion in 2008 to K30, 097.3 billion in 2009 accounting for 48.8 percent of the total GDP.

The Gross Capital Formation consists of Gross Fixed Capital Formation, which is broadly defined as the value of acquisitions, less disposals, of new and used fixed assets by producers, and changes in inventories. Additions to the existing capital stock were valued at K14, 737.0 billion, accounting for 23.9 percent of total GDP in 2009. Changes in inventories were valued at K945.6 billion, accounting for 1.5 percent of total GDP.

The balance of exports and imports, which is the difference between the

exports and imports of goods and services, was valued at K1,821.7 billion. The positive balance implies that the country recorded a trade surplus in 2009, compared to the trade deficit valued at K1,039.1 billion recorded in 2008.

Exports of goods and services increased from K19, 399.2 billion in 2008 to K22, 604.2 billion in 2009. Imports of goods and services also increased from K20,483.3 billion in 2008 to K20, 782.6 billion in 2009.

Aggregate Supply and Demand of Goods and Services

Measured in current prices, the value of goods and services supplied in the economy was estimated at K85,398.1 billion in 2009 compared to K75,277.7 billion in 2008. Both domestic production and imports of goods and services increased. The increase in domestic production was mainly attributed to increased output in agriculture, mining, construction and communications. The increase in imports of goods and services was mainly attributed to the increased

importation of fuels, oils and lubricants as well as machinery and equipment.

Domestic demand, which consists of final consumption expenditures of government and households and gross capital formation, also increased from K51,089.0 billion in 2008 to K59,793.5 billion in 2009. The total demand, which consists of domestic demand and exports of goods and services, was valued at K82,397.7 billion in 2009.

CENSUS SCHEDULED FOR OCTOBER 2010!

The Census of Population and Housing is carried out under the provisions of the Census and Statistics ACT Chapter 127 of the laws of Zambia. Under this ACT the Central Statistical Office is mandated to carry out a Census of Population and Housing every ten years. The first comprehensive census was carried out in 1969. Since then, three more censuses have been carried out, in 1980, 1990 and 2000. The next census will be carried out this year (2010).

Under this ACT, all persons residing in Zambia, except foreign diplomats accredited to Zambia are required to provide the necessary information.

WHAT IS A CENSUS?

A Census of Population and Housing is defined as the total process of collecting, compiling, evaluating, analyzing and publishing demographic, economic and social data pertaining, at a specified time or times, to all persons in a designated area or the whole country. It is the primary source of information about the population of a country. It is undertaken at regular intervals, usually after ten years.

WHY HOLD A CENSUS?

The main objective of conducting a Population Census is to enumerate all the people in the country in order to provide the Government, private organizations, individuals, and other stakeholders with the number of persons in each district, township, locality, village, etc., according to age, sex, and other characteristics. For every aspect of planning, it is essential to know the size, structure and distribution of the population of a country. For instance, to plan for education, the country needs to have numbers of the school going population by sex and age.

CENSUS ACTIVITIES

Being a huge undertaking, the census encompasses various activities for its success. These include pre census, census and post census activities. Pre census activities include census mapping, pilot census, formation of committees to coordinate all aspects of the census, publicity, stakeholder consultations, recruitment and procurement.

The pilot census is carried out on sample basis to test the methodology of the census including questionnaire suitability, logistical arrangements, mapping, staffing and other resource requirements. The main census involves collection of data on all persons in the country. The post census activities include Post Enumeration Survey, data processing and analysis, report writing and dissemination.

CENSUS MAPPING

One of the most important activities that the office carries out before a census is the census mapping exercise. The objective of this exercise is to delineate the country into enumeration areas (EAS) to ensure that there is no duplication or omission of persons or households during the Census.

A census mapping is also undertaken in order to:

- Determine the location of the population in advance of the census enumeration in order to make possible the recruitment, training and allocation of a sufficient number of enumerators to ensure that census enumeration is completed in time without omissions or duplications;
- Establish the framework for sample surveys prior to, during or after census enumeration;
- Enable the Central Statistical Office to provide results of the census for areas whose locations are known.

The 2010 census mapping strategy has involved the use of the Global Positioning System (GPS) in rural areas and satellite imagery in major and small urban areas to delineate enumeration areas. The GPS is a modern tool that enables collection of precise geographic coordinates. So far, 90.1 percent of wards in the county have been mapped using a combination of GPS and Satellite imagery.

PILOT CENSUS

The Pilot Census was conducted in February, 2010. Two districts were selected from each of the provinces except for Central, Copperbelt and Lusaka where three districts were selected from each. Both rural and urban districts were selected in each province. In each of the selected districts, mapped and unmapped areas were selected. This was done in order to have a "feel" of enumeration in rural and urban areas; and in mapped and unmapped areas, even when it is anticipated that mapping will be completed at the time of enumeration.
