# INFLATION <br> CONSUMER PRICE INDEX <br> YEAR ON YEAR INFLATION RATE FOR JUNE 2018 DECREASES TO 7.4 PERCENT 

The year on year inflation rate as measured by the all items Consumer Price Index (CPI) for June 2018 decreased to 7.4 percent compared to 7.8 percent recorded in May 2018. This means that on average, prices of goods and services increased by 7.4
percent between June 2017 and June 2018.

The decrease in the annual rate of inflation was mainly attributed to the base effect arising from the adjustment in electricity tariffs in June 2017.

## YEAR ON YEAR FOOD AND NON-FOOD INFLATION RATE

The year on year (Annual) food inflation rate for June 2018 was recorded at 7.5 percent compared to 6.9 percent recorded in May 2018 indicating an increase of 0.6 percentage points. The increase in the annual food inflation rate is mainly as a result of price changes of a 20 litre tin of Maize grain and a 2 kg Packet of Sugar.

The year on year (Annual) non-food inflation rate for June 2018 was recorded at 7.3 percent from 8.9 percent recorded in May 2018, indicating a decrease of 1.6 percentage points. The decrease was mainly attributed to the base effect arising from the adjustment in electricity tariffs in June 2017.

## ANNUAL INFLATION RATE MOVEMENT BY CPI MAIN GROUP

The annual inflation rate for June 2018 measured by consumer price index main group increased for Food and Non-alcoholic Beverages; Alcoholic beverages and Tobacco; Clothing and Footwear; Communication; Recreation and Culture; and Miscellaneous goods and Services.

The annual inflation rate for June, 2018 reduced for Housing Water Electricity Gas and other Fuels; Furnishing, Household Equipment House Maintenance; Health; Transport and Education. The annual rate of inflation remained the same for Restaurant and Hotel.

## PROVINCIAL CONTRIBUTION TO OVERALL INFLATION

Lusaka Province had the highest provincial contribution of 2.2 percentage points to the overall annual inflation rate of 7.4 percent recorded in June 2018. This implies that the price movements in Lusaka Province had the greatest influence
on the overall annual rate of inflation. Copperbelt Province had the second highest provincial contribution of 1.3 percentage points while Luapula and North Western Province had the lowest contribution of 0.2 percentage points.

[^0]On a monthly basis, a comparison of retail prices between May 2018 to June 2018 shows that the national average price of a 25 kg bag of Breakfast Mealie meal decreased by 0.43 percent from K79.56 to K79.22 while the national average price of a 25 kg bag of Roller Mealie meal increased by 1.08 percent from K57.23 to K57.85 The national average price of a 20 litre tin of Maize grain
decreased by 1.20 percent from K30.74 to K30.37.

On an annual basis, a comparison of retail prices between June 2017 and June 2018 shows that the national average price of a 25 kg bag of Breakfast Mealie meal decreased by 17.80 percent from K96.37 to K79.22. The national average price of a 20 litre tin of Maize grain decreased by 16.59 percent from K36.41 to K30.37.

## INTERNATIONAL MERCHANDIZE TRADE

## May 2018 records a Trade Surplus

Zambia records a trade surplus of K245.4 Million in May 2018 from a trade deficit of K 1 , 812.9 Million recorded in April 2018. This means that the country exported more in May 2018 than it imported in nominal terms. Imports increased by 4.7 percent from K8,615.1 Million in April 2018 to K9,020.6 Million
in May 2018, while exports increased by 36.2 percent from K6,802.2 Million in April to K9,266.0 Million in May 2018. The trade surplus can be mainly explained by an increase in the Traditional Exports by 42.6 percent from K5, 128.9 Million in April 2018 to K7,314.3 Million in May 2018.

## Performance of Exports (Traditional and Non-Traditional Exports (TEs and NTEs)), May 2018 and April 2018

The Traditional Export earnings increased by 42.6 percent from K5,128.9 Million in April 2018 to K7,314.3 Million in May 2018. The share of TEs recorded an average of 77.2 percent in revenue earnings between May 2018 and April 2018.

Non-Traditional Exports (NTEs) increased by 16.6 percent from K1,673.3 Million in April 2018 to K1,951.7 Million in May 2018. The share of NTEs recorded an average of 22.9 percent in revenue earnings between May 2018 and April 2018.

## Zambia's Exports of Copper by Volume and corresponding LME prices, May 2018 and April 2018

The volume of Copper exported in May 2018 decreased by 0.7 percent from 80,081.2 metric tonnes in April 2018 to $79,514.6$ metric tonnes in May 2018.

The Copper prices on LME market for the corresponding months decreased by 0.2 percent, from $\$ 6,838.55$ per metric tonne in

April 2018 to $\$ 6,821.76$ per metric tonne in May 2018.

Since Copper accounts for the largest weight/ proportion of Traditional Exports, any change in the volume and price/value has a direct bearing on the performance of Traditional

Exports.

## Performance of Non-Traditional Exports (NTEs), May 2018 and April 2018

For the purpose of this analysis, NonTraditional Exports are divided into Agricultural and Non-Agricultural products.

## Agricultural Products

Agricultural products accounted for a share of 23.7 percent of Zambia's Non-Traditional Exports (NTEs) in May 2018 compared to 17.2 percent recorded in April 2018.

The export earnings from Agricultural products recorded a 60.8 percent increase from K287.4 Million in April 2018 to K462.1 Million in May 2018. The major export commodities were 'Tobacco not stemmed/stripped' (25.3 percent), 'Oil-cake and other solid residues of soya bean' (16.4
percent) and 'Raw cane sugar' (11.5 percent).

## Non-Agricultural Products

Non-Agricultural products accounted for a share of 76.3 percent of Zambia's NonTraditional Exports (NTEs) in May 2018 compared to 82.8 percent recorded in April 2018.

The export earnings from Non-Agricultural products recorded an increase of 7.5 percent from K1,386.0 Million in April 2018 to K1,489.6 Million in May 2018. The major export commodities were 'Articles of stone or other mineral substances nes' (9.8 percent), 'Cobalt oxides and hydroxides' (9.6 percent) and 'Sulphuric acid' (9.2 percent).

## Exports by Major Product Categories, May 2018 and April 2018

Zambia's major export products in May 2018 were from the intermediate goods category (mainly comprising Copper anodes for electrolytic refining and Cathodes of refined copper) accounting for 88.0 percent. Exports
from the Consumer goods, Raw Materials and Capital goods categories, collectively accounted for 12.0 percent of total exports in April 2018.

## Zambia's Major Export Destinations by Commodity in May 2018

The major export destination in May 2018 was Switzerland, which accounted for 55.6 percent of the total export earnings. The major export product to Switzerland was Cathodes and sections of cathodes of refined copper, accounting for 62.3 percent of total export earnings from that country, followed by Copper anodes for electrolytic refining (31.9 percent).

China was the second main destination of Zambia's exports accounting for 13.5 percent of the total export earnings. The main export product to China was Copper blister, accounting for 49.8 percent of total export earnings from that Country.

Congo DR was the third main export destination accounting for 7.7 percent of the
total export earnings. The major export product was Sulphuric acid; oleum in bulk accounting for 19.1 percent of total export earnings from that country.

South Africa was the fourth main export destination accounting for 5.0 percent of the total export earnings. The major export product was Bullion semi-manufactured forms, accounting for 29.1 percent of total export earnings from that country.

The fifth main export destination was Singapore, which accounted for 4.3 percent of the total export earnings. The major export products were Copper anodes for electrolytic refining, accounting for 35.4 percent of total export earnings from that country.

These five countries collectively accounted
for 86.1 percent of Zambia's total export earnings in May 2018.

## Export Market Shares by selected Regional Groupings and Major Trading Partners, May 2018 and April 2018

Switzerland was the largest market for Zambia's total exports in May 2018, accounting for 55.6 percent.

Asia was the second largest market for Zambia's total exports, accounting for 21.8 percent in May 2018. Within this grouping, China was the dominant market with 61.9 percent. Other notable markets in this grouping were Singapore, United Arab Emirates, India and Hong Kong.

The DUAL- SADC \& COMESA grouping was the third largest market for Zambia's total exports, accounting for 10.7 percent in May 2018. Within this grouping, Congo DR was the dominant export market, accounting for 71.9 percent. Other notable markets in this
grouping were Malawi, Zimbabwe, Mauritius and Swaziland.

The SADC exclusive grouping was the fourth largest market for Zambia's total exports, accounting for 5.9 percent in May 2018. Within this grouping, South Africa was the dominant market with 85.2 percent. Other notable markets within this grouping were Namibia, Tanzania, Botswana and Lesotho.

The European Union grouping was the fifth largest market for Zambia's total exports, accounting for 2.9 percent in May 2018. Within this grouping, the United Kingdom was the dominant market with 54.0 percent. Other notable markets in this grouping were

Luxembourg, Germany, Netherlands and Italy.

The COMESA exclusive grouping was the sixth largest market for Zambia's total exports,
accounting for 0.9 percent in May 2018. Within this grouping, Kenya was the dominant market with 42.3 percent. Other notable markets were Burundi, Rwanda, Uganda and Ethiopia.

## Zambia's Major Import Sources by Product in May 2018

The major source of imports in May 2018 was Congo DR, accounting for 31.4 percent. The major import products were Cobalt oxides and hydroxides; commercial cobalt oxides in bulk, accounting for 51.9 percent of the total imports from that country.

The second main source was South Africa, accounting for 25.2 percent. The major import product was Sulphur of all kinds (excl. sublimed, precipitated and colloidal sulphur), which accounted for 5.5 percent of the total imports bill from that country.

China was the third main source of Zambia's imports, accounting for 10.7 percent. The major import products were Towers and lattice masts of iron or steel accounting for 9.5 percent of the total imports from that country.

Other sources of Zambia's imports were United Arab Emirates and Kuwait, which collectively accounted for 8.0 percent of Zambia's imports.

# 2018 FIRST QUARTER GROSS DOMESTIC PRODUCT (QGDP) 

## QUARTERLY GROSS DOMESTIC PRODUCT ESTIMATES Economy Grows by 2.6 Percent in the First Quarter of 2018

The year on year quarterly growth rates at constant 2010 prices show that the economy grew by 2.6 percent in the first quarter of 2018 compared to 3.2 percent in the first quarter of 2017. The Mining \& Quarrying industry contributed the highest to the first quarter growth with 1.4 percentage points, followed by the Financial \& Insurance, Information \& Communication and Wholesale \& Retail

Trade industries with $0.9,0.6$ and 0.4 percentage points respectively.

The industries with the highest growth rates were Information and Communication (28.1 percent), Financial and Insurance (26.6 percent) and Mining \& Quarrying (14.1 percent).

## FIRST QUARTER 2018 INDUSTRY VALUE ADDED AT CURRENT PRICES

The Gross Domestic Product at current prices in the first quarter of 2018 was estimated at K 61, 135.70 million compared to K 54,434.22 million recorded in the same period of 2017.

Analysis at industry levels show that out of $K$ 61, 135.70 million, the Wholesale \& Retail Trade industry had the highest share accounting for 18.7 percent. This was
followed by Mining \& Quarrying (13.8 percent) and Transportation \& Storage (9.5 percent) industries. The Manufacturing, Construction, Education and Agriculture, forestry \& fishing industries collectively accounted for an average of 7.6 percent. The Arts, Entertainment \& Recreation had the lowest share of GDP with 0.1 percent.
